Did you know?



Draw a plant, including leaves, a flower, stem and roots. Use the activity sheet to help label your plant and describe what each part does.






Activity 3 - Design a Stadium

GARDEN EXPLORERS

Draw a plant with a flower, stem, leaves and roots.

What does each part do?

Takes up water and nutrients from the soil. Keeps the plant steady and upright in the soil.

Carries water and nutrients to different parts of the plant.

Uses light from the sun, along with carbon dioxide from the air and water to make food for the plant. This process is called photosynthesis.

Involved in creating new life and produce seeds.
